#### Dear colleagues and friends!

One of the main features of the development of civil society is the establishment of a comprehensive system of health care and social insurance in the country. Moreover, the quality of these systems, in turn, is a critical criterion for the evaluation of the quality of civil society development. But, the health care system will not be considered perfect if it does not have a palliative component, along with preventive, curative and rehabilitative components, as in this case, a certain part of the population remains without medical care.

Despite the success achieved in the development of palliative care in Georgia over the past 20 years, the level of palliative care, as well as the coverage of the country with palliative care services, is far from the recognized international standards. This is due to the objective and subjective factors as well.

The authorities planning annually Palliative Care State Program as well as regulating agencies providing the monitoring of the program do not consider fully the recommendations of palliative care professionals as well as the experience gained worldwide.

The 2nd International Symposium "For the implementation of international standards of palliative care (legislative, educational, research and healthcare challenges)" will be held in Tbilisi on October 21-25 - within the framework of the General Assembly of the World Medical Association (WMA); therefore, the symposium will be the area of focus of not only Georgian but of the world medical community as well.

The internationally recognized experts of Palliative Care, Georgian experts, authorities, persons and institutions responsible for the development of all components (educational, legislative, health and clinical) of palliative care in the country as well as the delegates of the WMA General Assembly will take part in sessions, round-tables and scientific conference of the symposium.

We do hope that, on the one hand, the recommendations developed for the Governmental institutions (Parliament of Georgia, Ministry of Health, Ministry of Education and Science), will increase the "political" impact on the decision-making process, necessary for the development and implementation of international standards of palliative care in Georgia; on the other hand, the academic recommendations of the symposium will promote the development of undergraduate and post-graduate educational programs in palliative care and proper planning and implementation of the scientific researches in the field, including Ph.D. and Master Programs.

Therefore, we consider the symposium as an important stimulus for the development of a new edition of the Georgian National Program (Action Plan) of Palliative care - for the next 5 years.

The symposium materials will be distributed through the web-page of Tbilisi State University (TSU) and professional electronic networks in palliative care – including the websites of the International Association of Hospice and Palliative Care and the European Association for Palliative Care.

Abstracts of the symposium reports as well as developed recommendations will be published in the scientific journal of the TSU "Translational and Clinical Medicine – Georgian Medical Journal" indexed in Google Scholar.

The symposium will be widely reported in the media. The Georgian Medical TV Company "Pulse" will cover the symposium in detail and make a documentary film.

Georgia is home of first Europeans. The oldest human skull discovered in Dmanisi located in southern Georgia, Kvemo Kartli region. You can visit museum to see the **1.8** million year-old fossilized remains of the first discovered human couple in Europe whose names sound truly Georgian: Zezva and Mzia!




Georgia claims to be the birthplace of honey. The honey samples discovered in the village of Sakire, Borjomi (Southern Georgia) are believed to be made by the bees that buzzed in Georgia **5,500 years ago**. The 5,500-year-old honey samples are 2000-year older than the samples of Egyptian honey that were considered to be the oldest.



Georgian history dates back for several millennia, having its roots in the **second half of the III mill. BC.** Ancient Georgian tribe Tubal (Tuval) is mentioned in the Bible as founder of the metallurgy and blacksmith art. Ancient Georgian metallic artifacts are found spread across the entire Middle East – Mesopotamia, Syria and the Anatolian Kingdoms.



Georgia is country of Apostolic Autocephaly Orthodox Church (Christianity is state religion since 4th Century)



Winemaking can be dated back to **8000 BC in Georgia**, where evidence of grape cultivation has been found. The qvevri - an earthenware vessel used to store and age wine for thousands of years - is becoming the unofficial symbol of the country. Qvevri is listed in the Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity by UNESCO.



The discovery of the oldest dyed flax fibers in a cave in Georgia dated to thirty-six thousand years ago suggests that ancient people used wild flax fibers to create linenlike fabrics from an early date.



Georgia (old Colchis) is the motherland of Medea – the Kolkhetian Princess, the famous herbal physician holding the Golden Fleece (well-known from the Greek mythology). The word "Medicine" is related to her name.
